Are you part of an existing stakeholder group or network that is working to improve eye care for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in your area?

We want to hear from groups and networks across Australia who are keen to share their experiences and learning with others, as part of a national evaluation.



Indigenous Eye Health, at The University of Melbourne, are looking for EOIs from regional eye care stakeholder groups to participate as 'case study' regions for an evaluation of regional implementation of The Roadmap to Close the Gap for Vision.

Through these case studies, we aim to better understand and describe the activities that have been undertaken, the changes that have been seen, the key things that have worked and the challenges involved in improving eye care services and outcomes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people at a local or regional level.

What are we looking for?

We want to hear from existing groups of stakeholders who are working together to identify and address the eye care needs of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people within their local area or region.

Between 6-9 case study groups will be selected from across states and territories and will include urban, regional and remote settings.

What will be involved?

Your group will participate in a focus group discussion or individual interviews with independent evaluators from ARTD Consultants.

Focus groups and interviews will be held between February and April 2021. These may be via video, depending on travel restrictions at the time.
