Graham and his team will present a summary of findings from the first two and a half years of the Ngagagee Ngulu Murrup Durra project. Phase one included supporting Aboriginal specialist healing teams through establishing innovative, multi-service Communities of Practice that have been evaluated, and development of a grounded theory of healing from a workforce perspective. The team will also describe the establishment of an Aboriginal Lived Experience Leadership team that has been codesigning phase two of the project and which involves initiatives focused on building communities of support and better understanding the healing needs and experiences of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander survivors of child sexual abuse in Victoria.



A/Prof Graham Gee is an Aboriginal-Chinese man, also with Celtic heritage, originally from Darwin. His grandfather was born near Belyuen on the Cox Peninsula, Larrakia Country. Graham is a clinical psychologist and researcher. He is leading an NHMRC Grant involving 6 Victorian Aboriginal service partners that aims to improve understanding and responses to the healing needs and experiences of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander survivors of child sexual abuse in Victoria.
